THE YEAR IN REVIEW 2017

January

Twenty seventeen found the P/WMDAS in strong financial health with a treasury balance near \$4000.00. Plans were formulated to fund a progressive raffle, to provide a fee free hunt to the members and to consider more prizes and coins to be made available at meetings and the Jimmy See Classic.

The new meeting site at the Trinity Lutheran Church has provided a very satisfactory venue for Club meetings. The year started off with noted member and detectorist Todd Yerks presenting a program on successful techniques for gaining access to prime Colonial sites. With adequate parking and good lighting available more programs are planned for the New Year.

February

February kicked off the long awaited progressive raffle. Limited to 310 tickets sold to members only the initial sale generated nearly \$100.00 in sales. As the cyber generated world continues to turn Don Mituzas announced that P/WMDAS now has its own Face Book page and will soon provide members with access to Pay Pal to facilitate funding Club business and activities. Members continue to make spectacular finds in some of the NYC Parks. A glitch unfortunately has developed regarding detecting in Prospect Park. Hunting is currently under suspension but it is hoped that calls made by President Mituzas will have it reopened soon. The unusually mild winter has made detecting possible both at the coast and many inland sites. The Finds of the Month display for both January and February has been exceptionally well stocked. We continue to be unsuccessful in filling the position of Events Coordinator.

March

The progressive raffle continues to be well received with ticket sales going well. Still a lot of frozen ground but the April hunt at Flanders in Connecticut is only a few weeks away. April

Attendees must be members of the Stamford Club. The first outing is the new Holcott-Catskill hunt scheduled for June 11th and 12th. This is a first come first serve event limited to 40 detectors. The great Catskill hunt will be held August 11th-August 13.

As obtaining hunt sites becomes more and more difficult small parcels may have to be considered. If necessary these will filled by lottery with spots drawn according to the acreage available. The finder of the site is automatically included in those allowed to detect.

May

Members are encouraged to join local Historical Societies, land Trusts and civic organizations in an effort to make contacts leading to hunt site acquisitions. Family memberships are available to encourage young hunters to join in Club activities. Each child under 16 years of age is a full member for \$5.00 BUT must be accompanied by an adult for insurance purposes while in the field.

June

The ring's owner in turn wrote a "thank you" check for \$50.00 made payable to the Club. The September meeting time will be changed to avoid conflict with the Labor Day Holiday.

Finds were highlighted by the appearance of a 1652 Pine Tree Shilling recovered from a cellar hole by Don Bailey.
